Letter from the WFPNA Secretary

As secretary for the WFPNA I welcome all returning members to the Association and encourage others to join. We have great events and try to share neighborhood news.

Since I am in the healthcare field, and summer is upon us, I thought I would share some important information about bee and wasp stings. These insects will nest around your homes and also in the ground. One of our neighbors told me he recently ran over a nest with his golf cart and it really made them mad and aggressive!

More people die each year from the effects of insect venom than from spider or snake bites. Unlike most other allergies, insect allergy can cause life-threatening disruption to breathing and circulatory systems called anaphylactic shock. For one person in 100, the sting of an insect can be fatal. Doctors believe that once systemic (whole body) sensitivity (hives, wheezing, vomiting, difficulty breathing etc) occurs, it almost always increases in severity with each following sting.

If the above has happened to you or a family member, you should notify your healthcare provider and carry medication to be given immediately.

Simple preventive measures should also be taken such as having a professional remove large nests. Other measures are as follows: when eating outdoors – keep food covered until eaten; keep refuse in tightly sealed containers; pick fruits as soon as they ripen; perfume, heavy scented lotions attract; flowery prints and black attract – wear white or light colored clothing. If a bee/wasp fly near you, slowly raise your arms to protect your face and either stand still or move slowly away.

Hypersensitive persons should wear a medic Alert Tag and carry an emergency kit. Enjoy your summer and stay safe.

General Meeting Notes

Approximately 30 residents attended the May 9 General Meeting at Santiago Elementary School.

Welcome: Steve Tancredi welcomed everyone and thanked them for coming and their ongoing support.

Speakers:

Erlinda Martinez, President of SAC, informed all regarding the Master Plan and the planned changes for Santa Ana College. The following projects will be or have been built or renovated: Digital Arts Program opened in September, new electric marquis on the corner of 17th and Bristol, temporary closure of the sports track for replacement of the surface should be completed in mid-July, an exercise PE room complex opened in May, negotiating with the city to purchase and close College Ave. in August, ground breaking for new classroom building to replace current portable structures took place in September, property across College Ave was purchased and will be the site of the new soccer field, a 1,499 car parking structure will replace the old soccer field, the Sheriff's Regional Training Facility will be moving from the college to the Tustin Air Base this summer, **all residents in the four neighborhoods surrounding SAC will receive VIP cards with two tickets to attend a free event of their choice at the college which will be valid for one year.**

Officer Mike Claborn, SAPD, announced there have been 4-5 attempted burglaries in the neighborhood near the creek and the walking overpass in the past month. Most homes had alarms that scared away the burglar. The police are now performing regular sweeps of the creek bed and have found people living under the Bristol overpass. Several arrests have been made and no further disturbances have been reported in the past 20 days. Ofcr. Claborn advised residents to take precautions such as locking doors and windows, arming security systems, reporting strangers by dialing 911 preferably from a landline rather than a cell phone.

Mark McLoughlin, President of Floral Park Neighborhood Assn. and his wife were present and wished to express their thanks to all who attended their recent Home Tour and to those who graciously volunteered. He let us know that it takes appx. 400 volunteers each year to make this event a reality.


West Floral Park Membership News

Neighborhood Fruit Harvest

Have you noticed? We are blessed with an abundance of happy, fruit-bearing trees throughout the neighborhood. There are many delicious fruits grown in our front and back yard spaces: avocados, pomegranates, oranges, lemons, limes, and guava - all patiently waiting to be picked and eaten! Many trees produce far more fruit than a single household can consume during the harvest season. And that is the reason WHY we are launching the WFP Fruit Co-op. Our WFP Fruit Co-op will work like this:



- The Co-op coordinates the fruit supply, communicates fruit availability, and helps with fruit distribution.
- Fruit Co-op Membership is open to any WFP resident who wishes to join. Membership is free and so is the fruit. Your name, an email address (preferred) or phone number (for our elderly members not online), and a street address are required.
- Members who have fruit bearing trees need to register their harvest with the Co-op.


- Volunteers will come to pick your fruit OR you can pick it yourself.
- The Co-op will notify all Members by email when a new harvest is received. Pickup times and pickup location will be identified as well.
- All fruit is staged for a very short period of time. First come - first served. Volunteers will deliver fruit to elderly residents and to those members who need special help.

You are probably aware that consuming fruit is a good thing, but did you know that locally grown fruit provides many additional health benefits? In addition, it is far better to get ripe fruit off of the tree as soon as possible and not to let it rot on the ground (sorry possums!).

Vibrant Urban Living at City Place

City Place is an 18-acre, \$125 million, mixed-use project expected to deliver an exciting urban alternative to suburban life in the heart of Orange County. Jack Fisher Park Revitalization Report

The second meeting for the Jack Fisher Park Revitalization Project was held on June 20. Residents of Jack Fisher Park, Floral Park, and West Floral Park were in attendance. Ron Ono from the City of Santa Ana, Councilmember Carlos Bustamante, and representatives from the City of Santa Ana Police Department were present. There is \$125,000 available from the Shea Homes development project for this revitalization project. Matching funds from other sources are also a consideration.

a more prominent position. Also proposed are a separate adventure play area for older kids which would be situated further into the park and an extended walk which would become a nature/jogging trail leading to the back of the park. The plan also included creating a hummingbird and butterfly sanctuary with a banding of plants along the creek bed.

There was quite a lot of discussion about park usage and about homeless people using the creek bed and park.


Mr. Ono presented a proposed plan for the park based upon input from the first meeting. Fencing along the front of the park would consist of rock pilasters 8 feet apart joined by split railing. This would give the park the physical barrier it needs while maintaining a country-like feel. There will be two openings to the park—one a pedestrian entrance and the other a vehicle entrance (current place). The vehicle entrance would have a locked rolling gate to restrict unauthorized vehicles. The cannon would be moved to the front of the park to take

Generally, the residents present agreed to the conceptual design of the revitalization project, as presented. This proposed plan would require more than the \$125,000 available from the City. Mr. Ono will now cost out each portion of the plan and then present to the group. At that time, prioritization of what is to be funded first, etc. will occur.
